

BA in French

The French section of the Department of Languages and Linguistics offers the undergraduate major and minor. It collaborates with the College of Education in preparing future French teachers. French also supports other programs across the university, including Spanish, Linguistics, History, Psychology, Political Science, and Women's Studies. French is an excellent minor for many Liberal Arts majors such as psychology and political science because of the influence of French history and thought both in the past and in these areas today.

Students can earn a BA in French: 30 semester hours, at least 24 of which must be advanced (3300-4300) level. Course numbers FREN 1301 and FREN 1302 cannot count toward the major. Courses FREN 2301 and FREN 2302 must be completed in a language other than the major in order to fulfill the Liberal Arts language requirement.

Several Linguistics and Spanish courses are required for certification in Bilingual Education. Interested students must consult the departmental undergraduate advisor.
