

BA in Creative Writing

UTEP offers a bachelor's degree in Creative Writing through a curriculum that combines literary studies with intensive writing workshops. The program emphasizes the rigorous study of literature alongside the acquisition of skills in the writing of fiction, poetry, essays, plays, screenplays and literary translation. As such, the degree plan strikes a balance between theory and practice, between critical and imaginative thinking. As students progress in their degree plan, they are free to place emphasis on or specialize in the study and writing of a specific genre. The creative-writing faculty is comprised of well-published, active writers who also have a passion for teaching. They believe in closely mentoring students to give them a quality experience as writers in the making.

3. Read, interpret and evaluate contemporary writing and the works of peer writers from the perspective of literary craft and the study of creative writing.
4. Apply principles of creative writing to improve communication in a variety of contexts, including personal, academic, and public life.
5. Demonstrate an understanding of the creative process as a forum for critical and intuitive thinking, and as a means of creative problem-solving.
6. Perform applied research, gather data, and compose articulate narratives based on these findings.
7. Demonstrate awareness of the literary, cultural, and historical context within which contemporary writing takes place, including past and present literary forms, techniques, and traditions that inform contemporary writing.
8. Learn the workshop process of self and group evaluation and critique.
9. Demonstrate knowledge of editing and revision techniques.
